RESOURCES

Leveling Text

Numerous tutors have asked how to know how hard or easy a book is. Did you know Microsoft Word has a special feature that allows you to find out the reading level? I recommend typing in 100 words of continuous text from the front of a book or article, 100 words from the middle, and 100 words from the back. Then, check out these directions from Microsoft on how to make sure you can see the leveling information: https://support.office.com/en-us/article/Test-your-document-s-readability-85b4969e-e80a-4777-8dd3-f7fc3c8b3fd2.

A box will pop up with different numbers in it. Use the Flesh-Kincaid number. If comes back 6.5, it means the average sixth grader in the fifth month of school should be able to read the text. If you do not have access to Word, you can also use this free tool to get the same number:

http://www.readabilityformulas.com/free-readabilityformula-tests.php.

Look back at your student(s)' most recent CASAS reading level, and you will know if the book or article is a good readability level!

Student Tardiness and Absences

Adult learners have a variety of challenges that can make it difficult for them to be punctual or present to every meeting despite their wishes to do so. We want the time of both our students and tutors to be honored. If your student is having troubles coming on time, consider the following:

- 1. Ask what is happening before your scheduled meeting. Our students lead busy work, family, and personal lives. If possible, change the time to start a little later.
- 2. Let your student know how long it takes you to get to your tutoring site. Remind him/her to call or text with enough notice to prevent you from driving across the county for no reason. If needed, use an app or website like Google Translate to make sure the message is clear or ask Loyda for assistance!
- 3. Contact Loyda and Desiree if a student has missed *two consecutive classes without contacting you*. We are your greatest support when communication breaks down.
- 4. Most importantly, be empathetic to your student(s)' individual situations. Adult learners benefit greatly from tutors who are respectful of personal issues that prevent them from studying as much as they would like to!
